The New Deal seeks to protect and restore nature for the benefit of people and planet, proposing no more loss of natural spaces or extinctions as well as halving the negative ecological impacts of production and consumption.

The New Deal

will provide enough food and water for a global population that will grow to nine billion people in coming decades, support efforts to create a stable climate, and prevent a mass extinction of wildlife.



What is Sembang@WWF?
