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FACTS ABOUT CLIMATE CHANGE

Tiger

numbers in the wild have declined to as few as 3,200, largely due to poaching and habitat loss.

Climate change

is likely to result in increasing sea levels and further risk of fire in the already fragmented habitats where tigers live.

OCEANS

are vital 'carbon sinks', meaning that they absorb huge amounts of carbon dioxide, preventing it from reaching the upper atmosphere. Increased water temperatures and higher carbon dioxide concentrations than normal, which make oceans more acidic, are already having an impact on oceans.



Climate change impacts vary in different kinds of forests. Sub-Arctic boreal forests are likely to be particularly badly affected, with tree lines gradually retreating north as temperatures rise.

In tropical forests such as the Amazon, where there's abundant biodiversity, even modest levels of climate change can cause high levels of extinction.



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What is Sembang@WWF?

Storytelling connects us to humanity because it helps us relate and empathize. With the magic of storytelling, we created a platform called 'Sembang@WWF' in our youth programme. The session gives an opportunity for students to speak on various environmental issues. 

Dr Renard Siew (Climate Reality Leader The Climate Reality Project)

Renard serves as a Climate Reality Leader with the Climate Reality Project. He serves as CoChair of the Climate Change and Disaster Risk Management Working Committee and was a subgroup lead for the United Nation's Collective Climate Action Task Force.

He is also recognised as an Expert Network Member of the World Economic Forum. Prior to this, he was with the Centre for Energy and Environmental Markets (CEEM) where he has worked on a number of portfolios including sustainability/ integrated reporting, ESG integration, socially responsible investment (across different asset classes: equities, infrastructure and property/real estate), climate change and sustainable construction for the building/infrastructure sector.

He has published in many international refereed journals. In 2014, he won a Highly Commended Paper award by the Emerald Literati Network and was inducted into the prestigious Global Young Academy as recognition of his research impact.

For his work in sustainability, he was named one of Asia's 21 Young Leaders by Asia Society, a Young Leader by the World Cities Summit, Malaysia's Top 10 Most Inspiring Green Warriors and was listed as 50 most prominent Green Warriors by Tatler.
